- Big three distributors
- Plus Johnson & Johnson
- Finalized in 2022
- Subject to MOA



## **WAVE TWO**

- CVS, Walmart & Walgreens
- Plus Teva & Allergan
- Finalized in 2023
- Subject to MOA (pursuant to SAAF)



## KROGER

To be finalized in 2024

- \$1.37 billion = national total
- \$40 million = NC total



## KROGER (cont'd)

- Will be subject to MOA (pursuant to SAAF-2 locals will be asked to approve)
- Local sign-on deadline will be around early August 2024
- We will need same counties & municipalities to sign on as in Waves One & Two



## **BANKRUPTCIES**

## Subject to the MOA:

- Mallinckrodt
  - All projected payments made in FY23-24
  - Possible payment in future
- Endo
  - Full payment expected in FY24-25
  - Likely around \$10 million for NC



## PURDUE BANKRUPTCY

- Supreme Court deciding if Purdue settlement (as it structured) can include the Sacklers
  - If Court allows settlement to proceed, payments likely will begin in FY24-25
  - If Court does not allow settlement to proceed, there will be efforts to restructure the settlement and/or litigation will recommence



## PURDUE BANKRUPTCY (cont'd)

If Court allows settlement to proceed:

- National total = \$5.5 billion
- NC total = \$100+ million
- Payments over 18 years



## PAYMENT SCHEDULE

- Includes Wave One, Wave Two, and Mallinckrodt
- Does not (yet) include Kroger, Purdue, or Endo
- All amounts for FY22-23 & FY23-24 have been paid




## PAYMENT SCHEDULE



Schedule of estimated payments for each of the 114 North Carolina counties and cities receiving payments from the national opioid settlements







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

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





- Local governments need to meet both requirements for NC MOA (resolution) and state law (budget ordinance)

#### A RESOLUTION BY THE COUNTY OF TO DIRECT THE EXPENDITURE OF OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS

WHEREAS \_\_\_\_\_ County has joined national settlement agreements with companies engaged in the manufacturing, distribution, and dispensing of opioids, including settlements with drug distributors Cardinal, McKesson, and AmerisourceBergen, and the drug maker Johnson & Johnson and its subsidiary Janssen Pharmaceuticals;

WHEREAS the allocation, use, and reporting of funds stemming from these national settlement agreements and certain bankruptcy resolutions ("Opioid Settlement Funds") are governed by the Memorandum of Agreement Between the State of North Carolina and Local Governments on Proceeds Relating to the Settlement of Opioid Litigation ("MOA").

WHEREAS \_\_\_\_\_ County has received Opioid Settlement Funds pursuant to these national settlement agreements and deposited the Opioid Settlement Funds in a separate special revenue fund as required by section D of the MOA;

WHEREAS section E.6 of the MOA states:

#### E.6. Process for drawing from special revenue funds

- a. Budget item or resolution required. Opioid Settlement Funds can be used for a purpose when the Governing Body includes in its budget or passes a separate resolution authorizing the expenditure of a stated amount of Opioid Settlement Funds for that purpose or those purposes during a specified period of time.
- Budget item or resolution details. The budget or resolution should (i) indicate that it is an authorization for expenditure of opioid settlement funds; (ii) state the specific strategy or strategies the county or municipality intends to fund pursuant to Option A or Option B, using the item letter and/or number in Exhibit A or Exhibit B to identify each funded strategy, and (iii) state the amount dedicated to each strategy for a stated period of time






